I Didn't Hear It... Rev. Dave Bennett, PEC President



NEW: Advent Candle Lighting Liturgy

As we approach the Advent season, we are excited to share a special resource – a four-week liturgy for use in lighting the Advent wreath candles. This resource was created as a collaboration between the Board of World Mission, the Moravian Ministries Foundation, and the Southern Province Commission on Congregational Development (with many thanks to the Interprovincial Board of Communications for their assistance in promoting it!). This partnership between Moravian agencies reflects our shared commitment to supporting and strengthening the Moravian Church through collective action, showing that we are stronger when we serve and worship together.

The Advent Candle Lighting Liturgies for 2024 provides a short liturgical guide through the themes of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love, connecting these Advent themes with the real-life ministries of Moravian congregations and organizations. Each week's liturgy is rooted in Moravian tradition, offering powerful examples of the Church's work across the world. These liturgies also create space for your congregation to highlight the ways you are bringing these themes to life through your own ministries and outreach.

Through these liturgies, we are invited to remember that Jesus is the Light of the World, and we, as His followers, are called to reflect that light in our communities. We pray this resource will enrich your Advent worship, bringing together your congregation to celebrate and share the hope, peace, joy, and love that comes through Christ's coming into the world.

The Emerging Ministries Committee has hired two new part-time coordinators to support the work of our Northern Province emerging ministries. T. C. Moore is serving as the Leadership Development Coordinator and Evan Taylor is the Ministry Development Coordinator. Read more about each of their roles and background below, and please help us welcome them warmly to the ministry of the Northern Province!



Rev. T. C. Moore is a graffiti artist, circle-keeper, and theology nerd. Since Jesus liberated him from gang-life as a teenager, he's followed God's call to the cities of New Orleans, Boston, Los Angeles, and Minneapolis-Saint Paul. For over two decades he's served youth and families by developing mentoring programs, church-planting, teaching theology, shepherding congregations, and working for justice in community-based organizations. He's a graduate of Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary's Center for Urban Ministerial Education in Boston and he currently serves co-vocationally in Saint Paul, Minnesota as pastor of Roots Moravian Church and as a restorative justice practitioner for court-involved youth through the Power in Peace diversion program. He's the author of Forged: Following Jesus into a New Kind of Family (Broadleaf, 2024) and he and his wife, Osheta, live in Saint Paul with their three adult children.

In his new role as Leadership Development Coordinator (LDC), T. C. is charged with collaborating with the Emerging Ministries Committee (EMC) and the new Ministry Development Coordinator (MDC) to recruit, train, and assess leaders for service in emerging ministries and new faith communities. T. C. believes there are many called and gifted ministers and lay leaders who are searching for a denominational home like the Moravian Church Northern Province. Like him and Osheta, many are leaving Evangelical denominations in order to embrace God's expansive love and inclusion of all people, regardless of race, ability, gender identity, or sexual orientation. He dreams of a new generation of Moravians embracing our missional roots with Spirit-inspired expressions of contextual ministry that witness to the power of Christ's Gospel and the in-breaking kin(g)dom of God.



Reverend Evan Blaire Taylor is an Itinerant Deacon in the African Methodist Episcopal Church (AME) and serves on the ministerial staff at Metropolitan AME Church in Washington, DC. She is equal parts creative & technologist with a penchant for equity, education, and storytelling. Evan uses equity-centered design thinking, coaching, and integrated technology to transform user-centered experiences, ministries, and faith communities. She embraces her calling to serve as a catalyst for equity in education, entrepreneurship, and faith communities. As a coach, Evan accompanies seminarians, founders & ministry leaders as they discover, explore, and articulate their vocation. As a technologist, she has served as the webmaster, communications coordinator, and

assisted with the website design for Metropolitan AME Church; Designed and refreshed the website for Life Change AME Church; and designed landing pages for the Potomac District of the 2nd Episcopal District and Ebenezer AME Church – Charlotte Hall. She hopes to use her vision, talents and her philanthropic investments to connect communities to resources; unearth gifts, skills, and talents; promote healing and reconciliation across lines of difference; and create pathways to leadership in the church, and the world.

She earned her undergraduate degrees in Mass Communications and Political Science from the Southern University and A&M College in Baton Rouge, Louisiana; an MBA from Strayer University; and an M.Div. from Wesley Theological Seminary, both in Washington, DC. She also completed the Institute of Political Journalism program at Georgetown University. While at Wesley Theological Seminary, Evan served as Student Council President, editor of the Wesley Journal and as a Community Engagement Fellow.

As the new Ministry Development Coordinator of Emerging Ministries & New Faith Communities in the Moravian Church Northern Province, she plans to combine her coaching, nonprofit and ministry acumen to meet the needs of current and future emerging ministry leaders. Evan will lead partnering with emerging ministries to grow and scale their ideas and promote sustainability through coaching, resource development and administrative support. She hopes to expand emerging ministry engagement and grow the grant program.

The Moravian Music Foundation Appoints an Executive Director

The Board of Trustees of the Moravian Music Foundation (MMF) is pleased to announce the appointment of **Christopher Ogburn** as Executive Director of MMF. He will assume these duties, while continuing his programming and musicological work. Ogburn, a lifelong Moravian,



joined the Foundation in 2022 as the Director of Programming and Resident Musicologist.

He earned his Master of Philosophy in Music and Master of Arts in Music from The Graduate Center, City University of New York, New York, NY. He went on to study and complete his Ph.D. in Historical Musicology, September 2018, at The Graduate Center, City University of New York, New York, NY. His dissertation was Strauss and the City: The Reception of Richard Strauss's Salome, Elektra, and Der Rosenkavalier within New York City, 1907–1934. Ogburn earned a Bachelor of Music in Bassoon Performance and Minor in English Literature from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Prior to coming to the MMF, he taught and lectured at Manhattan College and LaGuardia Community College, before joining the faculty of Central Piedmont Community College as Instructor of Music.

He will be replacing Bruce Earnest, who passed away suddenly at the end of July.

You Belong continues to grow its respite care ministry, offering vital support to families with a loved one living with a disability. This ministry began in response to a need that the You Belong team recognized in the local community. Today, it has become one of the largest programs You Belong offers. The focus of this ministry is on three key groups: 1) individuals living with a disability, 2) their families, 3) community volunteers.

This program provides a meaningful gift to families: over five hours on a Saturday to rest and focus on self-care, knowing their family member is safe and well cared for. Many of the families served by You Belong live in a constant state of survival due to the demands of daily life. This time to relax and recharge is invaluable.

Beyond offering rest, these events create a space where people with and without disabilities can come together to build community. This supports You Belong's mission to transform our communities by fostering greater accessibility and inclusion. True change begins with those who don't live with a disability, and our volunteers play a crucial role in that. Not only are they essential to making these events possible, but they also gain a deeper understanding of disability. This experience helps them feel more confident and informed about connecting with and building relationships with individuals who may see and experience the world differently.



In November, the confirmation class from Lake Mills Moravian Church, along with Jane Berg and Rev. David Sobek, participated in an impactful day of ministry. They learned first hand the work being done at You Belong and they took part in having an impact in the lives of others.


The You Belong team invites all Moravians across the province to consider this kind of outreach in their own

When was it that we saw you sick and took care of you? In 2024, the BWM supported medical work through gifting medication, sending volunteer clinicians, and offering administrative support at the Ahuas Clinic in Honduras, the Bilwaskarma Clinic in Nicaragua, Star Mountain Rehabilitation Center in Palestine, the Moravian Clinic in Sikonge, and more.



When was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you? In 2024, the BWM provided housing for a Honduran family who lost everything in a devastating house fire, cared for Ukrainian refugees making a new home for themselves, began a Moravian Disaster Response effort to repair housing for those impacted by Hurricane Helene in North Carolina, led a cohort of Moravians learning about the immigration crisis in the U.S., expanded a Moravian exchange camper program, and more.



Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and fed you, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? In 2024, the BWM provided a decade of clean drinking water to four communities in Honduras, served meals to young children in La Moskitia through the Ahuas Clinic Infant Feeding Program, offered seeds and other food staples to global partner areas impacted by changing agricultural patterns, and more.



Faith and Advocacy: Young Leaders for Middle East Peace December 4th, 2024 - 11:00-12:15pm ET

Join CMEP 1835 for a panel-discussion about how faith can inform young Christians in advocating for Palestine. Ecumenical News

Lutheran-Anglican-Moravian Commission Meets



The Lutheran-Anglican-Moravian Commission (LAM-C) held its first in-person gathering November 13-15 in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. The purpose of this commission is to equip all three denominations – the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, the Anglican Church of Canada, and the Moravian Church Northern Province – to live more

fully into the tri-lateral full communion agreement approved by our various legislative bodies in 2023. Goals for this gathering were to get to know one another through our various worship expressions, discuss the orderly exchange of clergy, and explore ways we might bless the world through mutual and shared ministries in our communities. We focused specifically on the places where all three denominations are present in Canada – Edmonton, Calgary, and Toronto. Goals include reaching out to our siblings in the Labrador Province to invite their participation.

The Moravians hosted a worship service and Holy Communion in celebration of Christ the Chief Elder at the Heimtal Moravian Church, where forty-one people filled the sanctuary with the sounds of song and prayer. We also experienced a Smudging Ceremony led by an Indigenous member of the Standing Stone Circle, midday Eucharist in the Anglican tradition, and Holden Evening Prayer in the Lutheran tradition. Moravian members of the commission are Donna Gordon, Matt Gillard, Blair Couch, and Betsy Miller.

One of the gifts of the LAM-C is the development of a Prayer Cycle for use in weekly worship, in which a petition for each of the denominations is lifted up each week. The Moravians have been graciously included in this year's cycle of prayer. Pastors are encouraged to consider including these prayers throughout the year or on special occasions. Congregation Closure: MorningStar Moravian Church

With deep gratitude and heavy hearts, we announce that the MorningStar Moravian congregation in Coopersburg, PA will be concluding its ministry on December 31, 2024.

In a day when our congregations must seek partnerships and creative solutions to carry out ministry, we look to this congregation and its brave emergence in 2010. A merging of the Coopersburg and Grace congregations, MorningStar stepped out in faith and collaboration in order to continue in ministry.

The Coopersburg Moravian congregation in Coopersburg, PA, was established in 1883. It served the community for 127 years with vibrant Bible Studies, music ministry, and community outreach that included Moravian sugar cake sales, community yard sales, and a thriving Vacation Bible School. Grace Moravian Church in Center Valley, PA, was established in 1955. It shared more than five decades of ministry that included a ministry of hospitality, demonstrated though famous Easter morning breakfasts and swiss steak dinners, in addition to ministries of music and education.

Together, as the MorningStar congregation, they joined to continue in Christ's service. This took the form of wonderful worship, offering a meeting place for various community groups and activities, providing a safe place for the Providence Hybrid Academy, hosting a monthly community dinner, serving at Betty Lou's Pantry, and so much more. Current pastor, Sister Byrnese Craig, shares her appreciation for the congregation: "I've been so proud to witness the care and love for music that is a big part of worship at Morningstar. Not only do they love to sing, but they have used their music ministry to help train young musicians throughout the years, offering opportunities for learning and growth for anyone who loved to play and sing. Since 2021, they have done the same with their pastors, inviting in two students from Moravian Seminary to serve the congregation while pursuing their studies. Their support of learning and education has been a part of their congregational ministry for many years."

It is evident that the witness of the saints of MorningStar Moravian Church has reached far beyond what any of us will ever fully know or understand. Lives have been touched with the love of God through these faithful people. As stated by former pastor, Jay Petrella, "Whether you were gathered in the sanctuary for worship, around the table for a potluck, or in the kitchen kneading sugar cake dough, MorningStar felt like home. They weren't just people who happened to attend the same church; they were family, through joys and hardships." Please hold this community of faith in prayer as they celebrate their ministry over the coming weeks and worship together on their final Sunday, December 29th.

Ministry Closure: Esperanza for Bethlehem

On Sunday, November 24th, the Rev. PRESSING ON TOWARD THE GOAL

Meeting of the Executive Board and the Fellowship of Elders: On Saturday, November 2, 2024, 17 members of Christ Moravian Church (CMC) gathered in the community of Redwood Meadows near Calgary for a one-day Fall Leadership Retreat. The event provided an opportunity for the lay leadership to share about the current and future issues facing the organization. The theme of the event was: \cdot Re-Connect \cdot Re-Imagine \cdot Re-Commit

The event was led by Michael Ward, who currently serves as interim pastor of CMC. Michael presented an analogy from Matthew 9 about old wineskins and new wineskins. This thread guided our discussions throughout the day and allowed the group to re-connect and reflect on our habits, our methods, and perhaps opportunities to improve in the future.


Discovery: The dialogue within the group was sincere and tremendously helpful. Many participants were grateful that our church is still very alive and vibrant, despite the loss of our pastor of 27 years (Rev. Stephen Gohdes retired in January 2024). The initial fear and anxiety associated with Steve's retirement have now subsided, and we are thankful for the new leadership provided by our interim pastor. This resilience speaks to the strengths of our congregation, namely its unity and the care we provide for one another. The discussion also helped us realized that during this long period under the same leadership, the church has developed habits and methods that over time have become ingrained and a bit stiff like an old wineskin.

Highlights from the Breakout Sessions: After each breakout session, the teams were asked to provide a summary of their discussions. The issues raised and the ensuing dialogues provided valuable insights for the group. 1. The congregation is healthy, new members are coming in, and former ones have returned. The children program has been strengthened with new kids and renewed leadership. 2. All groups within the church remain active including Women's Fellowship, Men's Breakfast, Shepherds, Prayer Team, Music Team, Canasta, and the Bible Study group. 3. We continue to reach out to others through our Mission & Outreach program by supporting important causes such as Acadia Food Pantry, Rajpur, Mustard Seed, Refugee Families, Southwood Chapel, and with activities such as Christmas Tea & Craft Fair, Summer Fun Fair & Market and the Caregivers Seminar. 4. We have extended our presence online with our weekly worship live stream videos, our website and our Social Media campaign through the Digital Campus Ministry team. 5. Our congregation is aging. There seems to be an age gap behind our leadership team. Several of our long-time members have served the church for many years in multiple roles, and have expressed a desire to step back. There is a need for succession. 6. Some of our systems and methods are outdated, including software, financial and administrative practices, even our worship style, worship bulletin, overhead presentation, etc. We have a desire to move forward without losing our traditions.

In the end, Pastor Ward reminded us of the importance of re-committing, even as we await the appointment of a new full-time pastor. He described this transition phase not as a waiting period, but rather as an opportunity to re-imagine our church ministry. And as we do so, we trust that God will provide the right pastor at the right time to walk with us into the next phase of ministry! Submitted by: Bernard Amiot, Elder


